PASTOR'S CORNER

Repent and Believe in the Gospel

On Wednesday, we begin the time of Lent as we are signed with ashes in the form of a cross. This marks a time in our Church when we as faithful recognize that we are indeed sinners and yet have a desire to change our lives and live not

for our own selfish purposes but for God and for others. It is a time when we refocus and come to the recognition that we are not human unless Christ is in our life.

As early as the 7th Century, an Ash Wednesday ritual was held during which sinners guilty of capital sins, such as heresy, murder, and adultery, confessed their sins privately. Then they were presented to the bishop and publically enrolled in the ranks of penitents in preparation for absolution on Holy Thursday. They were expelled by the congregation in imitation of the expulsion of Adam and Eve from paradise, with a reminder that death is punishment for sin. They lived apart from their families and from the rest of the parish for 40 days of Lent (thus our word "quarantine"). Obviously, tradition has changed. The emphasis is now placed on personal rather than public sin. It is a time when each and every one of us works to quarantine ourselves from those sins that separate us from God and others.

The spiritual exercises of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that we observe during Lent are a means to bring focus and balance to our lives. As human beings, we need prayer. We need that intimate communication with God that comes through prayer. And so during this time of Lent, truly work to be a person of prayer. One Lenten opportunity we have here at St. Cecilia is our evening prayer speaker series. I hope all of you can take advantage of this great opportunity to take time out for God.

During this time of Lent, we abstain from things that harm our relationship with God, especially practices that become habitual and take over our lives. We also recognize in Lent that everything we have must be shared. We cannot let our own financial and material goals take over the obligation we have to feed, clothe, and shelter all those in need, especially those who need the Gospel.

As a parish, we will be participating in Operation Rice Bowl. This is a way to live out the spiritual exercises of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving while benefitting those in developing countries. It is also a tradition during Lent that the faithful across the archdiocese will be asked to support the efforts of the Catholic Ministries Appeal, as well as the missionary efforts in Eastern Europe on Ash Wednesday and the Holy Land Shrines on Good Friday.

Indeed, Lent is a time to turn away from focusing our lives on our own wants and needs and to live for the Gospel. I pray that all of us will join in the spiritual exercises of this season and truly feel the fulfillment that comes from serving God.

Amen? Amen!

SUNDAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS

7TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

- **Isaiah 43:** 18-19, 21-22, 24b-25
- **Psalm 41:** 2-5, 13-14
- **2 Corinthians 1:** 18-22
- **Mark 2:** 1-12

This Gospel passage prompted an intriguing "what if" scenario for me. What if those skeptical scribes were not present for this encounter between Jesus and the paralytic man? Upon seeing the paralyzed man, Jesus forgave his sins. In response to the incredulous scribes, Jesus further manifested his divine authority by healing the physical paralysis as well.

Here is the question that arose during my reflection: What if the scribes had not been there? Would Jesus have healed the man's paralysis? Would he have bidden the man to rise and walk or simply continued with his teaching?

Hypothetical proposals as to what Jesus would or would not do can be a slippery slope, but there is a point within this speculation. If Jesus had forgiven the man's sins but left him in his paralytic state, many might feel that the man was cheated somehow. Yet Jesus healed him in the manner most desperately needed. He attended to the man's spiritual paralysis first. After all, physical paralysis will not keep us from heaven. Cancer does not deny us union with God. A heart attack does not seal the pearly gates. It is our iniquities not our infirmities that prevent us from reaching paradise.

St. Paul once asked what it was that could separate us from the love of God. He reminded us that neither trial, distress, persecution, hunger, nakedness, nor any of the physical suffering of this world can keep us from our loving God. The only thing that separates us from God is sin.

Illness is not enough. Death is but a bump in the road. Unrepentant sin alone denies us our destiny with God. Sin caused the loss of paradise and that loss will persist unless sins are forgiven. Jesus, knowing full well what our truest needs are, saw what was ailing that poor man the most, and thus restored him to spiritual health.

What a blessing it was for that man to rise from paralysis and walk away from infirmity. How that pales in comparison to rising from death and walking with our heavenly Father for eternity. That is what Jesus longs to give us. He yearns to say to each of us, "Child, your sins are forgiven."

May the Word of God be in your thoughts, upon your lips, and in your hearts. God bless!

A CLOSER LOOK AT OUR FAITH

CATECHESIS (kat' i-ke' sis) n.

LENT

When we are marked with ashes this Wednesday, we will hear the words, "Repent, and believe in the Gospel." This exhortation strikes at the heart of the meaning of Lent. The word "Lent" (or "Lenten") is derived from the Old English "lencten," which means "spring," a time associated with new life and renewal. Just as in nature, where the transformation from winter to spring is not instantaneous, so our conversion and growth in the life of Christ requires work and time.

While not numerically accurate, the reference to Lent as the Forty Days underscores its spiritual character.

The number 40 calls to mind our biblical ancestors who spent 40 days or 40 years wandering, searching, waiting and listening for God.

For those preparing to be baptized, the rites of the Scrutinies mark this liturgical time as set apart for personal reflection and spiritual preparation for receiving the light and life of Christ at the Easter Vigil. For all of us, Lent is an opportunity to cleanse ourselves of those things that impede our living more fully our Christian vocation. By listening carefully to the scriptures of the liturgical time and participating in our traditional communal Lenten disciplines of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, we prepare ourselves for the journey into love, that is, into the heart of the Christian mystery.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS

Beginning this Friday, and continuing on every Friday during Lent, we will pray the Stations of the Cross at 7:00 p.m. in the church. During this special devotion, through meditation and prayer, we will walk with our Savior on His way of suffering from the time he was condemned to death until he died and was buried.

Making this devotion part of your Lenten commitment to prayer will help you grow closer to Christ. Surely there's not a better way to spend Friday evenings during Lent than to pray the Stations of the Cross together after dining on a delicious fish dinner in the cafeteria.

WORD OF THE WEEK

ABSTINENCE — *n.*, from the Latin "abstinere," meaning "to refrain from, to keep away" — The moral virtue that inclines a person to the moderate use of food or drink as dictated by right reason or by faith for his own moral and spiritual welfare.

As commonly understood, abstinence refers to refraining from certain kinds of food or drink and may be undertaken by a person spontaneously or it may be prescribed by ecclesiastical law, whether for the universal Church or for certain territories.

Institutes of Christian perfection may also have special provisions for abstinence according to their rule of life. In the United States, Ash Wednesday and Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat, since, "It is up to the bishops, gathered in their episcopal conferences, to establish the norms... which they consider the most opportune and efficacious."

Special note: Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are also days of fasting as well.

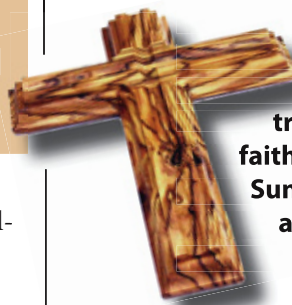
PALMS STILL BEING COLLECTED

† **Archbishop Elko Award:**

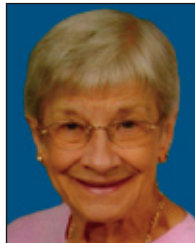

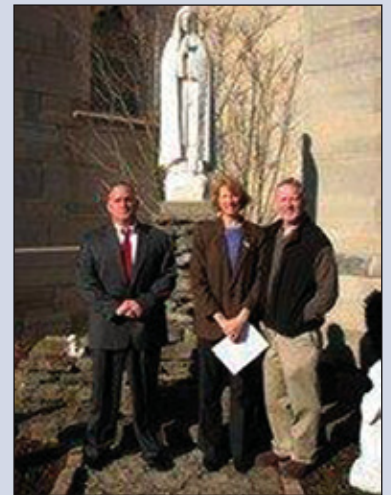
CONGRATULATIONS, ST. CECILIA AWARD WINNERS!
